Classroom Updates...

Chester Community Preschool

CCP1

Ms. Jodie, Ms. Karie and Ms. Sarah

We have been learning about Spring Things for the month of April! We turned our dramatic play area into a Pancake Cafe. The kids have had fun taking orders, preparing pancakes and serving up the food! We watched a video by Highlights Magazine titled Ever Wonder How Maple Syrup Is Made? This informative video explained the process of how sap is collected, boiled and then bottled. We then did a little syrup sequencing of our own! We had a walking field trip to The Country Girl Diner where we enjoyed pancakes, bacon and real maple syrup! What a great experience this was!

We painted "mud" on paper and then made bugs to go in the mud! This was a great process art activity where each child was able to explore the art tools we had to paint with. They also used a variety of shapes to create bugs! We made caterpillar names. The big letter **U** was turned into an **u**mbrella. We made a class book titled On A Rainy Day I Like To... The kids made drip drop paintings at the easel. The kids used blue watercolors mixed with glue and then used eyedroppers to make the paint drip from the top of the paper. They then added cotton balls at

the top to represent the clouds. We did a fun science experiment called Rain Cloud in A Jar. We took a large jar filled halfway with water, added shaving cream and then dripped blue watercolor on top. The kids made predictions about what would happen before we added the watercolor and then they were surprised to see what actually happened!

We made fresh squeezed orange juice, then the kids tried it compared to store bought juice, then we made a class graph. There were 10 people that liked fresh squeezed orange juice and 7 people that preferred the store bought juice! We added zinnias to our big letter Z then had the chance to plant some real zinnia seeds. We are excited to watch them grow into flowers. At the easel we explored painting flowers with forks! This process was so fun and they came out amazing!

We have a new worm farm in the classroom. This is a hands-on-learning adventure that will highlight the importance of worms in our ecosystem. The kids will be feeding the worms and observing them in their environment.

We are excited to be learning about Summer for the month of May!

Springtime Walks Around Town

We've been taking nature walks around town to spot signs of spring! The children loved pointing out blooming flowers, budding trees, chirping birds, and even a few puddles perfect for jumping. These walks help us observe seasonal changes and spark lots of conversation and curiosity. One special walk took us to the local diner, where we got to taste real maple syrup poured over warm pancakes—yum! It was a sweet way to learn about how maple syrup is made and enjoy a little springtime treat.

Sunflower Seed Names

The children used sunflower seeds to create their names! This fun, hands-on activity supported letter recognition and fine motor skills—plus, they loved feeling the texture of the seeds and seeing their names come to life in such a unique way.

Planting Flower Seeds

Little hands got a bit dirty (and had a lot of fun!) planting flower seeds. We talked about what plants need to grow and made predictions about when we'll see sprouts. The kids are so excited to care for their flowers and watch them grow day by day.

Rhyming Flower Memory Game

To keep language skills blooming, we played a rhyming flower memory game. The children matched flower cards with rhyming words (like "bee" and "tree"), building phonemic awareness while having lot'

Secondhand Marijuana Smoke

The known risks of secondhand exposure to tobacco smoke—including risks to the heart and lungs¹—raise questions about whether secondhand exposure to marijuana smoke causes similar health risks. Secondhand marijuana smoke contains many of the same toxic and cancer-causing chemicals found in tobacco smoke and contains some of those chemicals in higher amounts.²

Secondhand marijuana smoke also contains tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the compound responsible for most of marijuana's psychoactive effects (or the "high"). THC can be passed to infants and children through secondhand smoke, and people exposed to secondhand marijuana smoke can experience psychoactive effects, such as feeling high. 3,4 Recent studies have found strong associations between reports of having someone in the home who uses marijuana (e.g., a parent, relative, or caretaker) and the child having detectable levels of THC. 5,6 Children exposed to THC are potentially at risk for negative health effects. More research is needed to understand how secondhand marijuana exposure may affect children. 

Self-Assessment 2024-2025 Data Summary Report

March 14, 2025

This year the Self-Assessment process was held as an in-person, one day event to present, review and discuss the data sets the management team has worked on over the last several years. We are in year 5 of our grant cycle. The Self-Assessment Data Review was on Wednesday, March 14, 2025 from 9:00-2:00 We invited Head Start staff, SEVCA Staff, HS Policy Council, SEVCA Board, HS Parents and Community Members to join us for this data analyzing journey. The individuals that were able to attend and be part of the team to analyze the data consisted of: 7 Head Start staff, 5 staff from SEVCA, 1 (also on Policy Council) parent, and 2 community members.

This year's Self-Assessment was a little different than previous years, due to the Change in Scope that was approved in June 2024, which reduced the funded enrollment from 83 children to 45. Comparing data from the previous 4 years would not make sense, as the numbers would be too far skewed to make sense. So, we decided to use this year's data from September 2024 to February 2025. Next year we will plan to provide the picture for the full 2024-2025 program year, and then the third year, we will have another year to compare data too.

The Head Start Team reviewed data from the following areas: Enrollment/Eligibility, Attendance, Staff Turnover, 5 Year Goal Planning, Professional Development, Family Service PIR Data, Recruitment, BMI, Dental/Medical, Immunizations, Outcomes for children, School Readiness Goals, IEP/Referrals for children, Staff Qualifications, and CLASS scores. A power point presentation was shared to orient the participants on what Self-Assessment was all about. A Summary was also created from information shared by the participants to create areas of strength and areas that need to be improved for all data sets. The summary is shared below.

FAMILY SERVICES

Data Tracking and supplying family resources.

Direct supports to families (doctors, dentists, parent education) The overall strength is that of the Family Partner role. Having staff who do monthly contacts with families, two annual home visits, offering monthly engagement activities, as well as supporting teaching staff, has proven to develop positive relationships with parents so they feel comfortable participating in engagement activities, not only with other parents, but with their child's development. Parents are becoming empowered to be an advocate for their children and become partners of their child's educational development planning. They are also able to realistically see how it isn't impossible to meet their desires-moving, going back to school, finding employment. By having support and helping them with steps, goal planning becomes more realistic. Goals also can be anything. Getting a child to school or buying a house is a goal.


Getting parents to participate more in the classroom. Thoughts were to involve families in the classroom more.

They may be more apt to get involved in Parent Meetings and Parent Trainings. A couple suggestions were to have a "Secret Reader". Ask a parent to come in to read a story. The parent will be a secret to the children until they arrive, then showcase them in the newsletter. Another thought was to provide a schedule for the parents as to what they can do to volunteer when they are in the room. Also provide supplies for families who cannot come in. Maybe ask parents to cut out items for activities.

There was discussion around the types of housing that people have. Is it safe, enough space, warm enough, maintained? This is an area that we can look at and collect data on in the future.

We were surprised to see only half of our families are accessing WIC benefits. 93% of our families have Medicaid for insurance which is an automatic qualifier. More education around the program. Smoothie Recipe

Ingredients

- 1 banana, small, ripe
- 1 cup Frozen fruit (you choose your favorite)
- 8 ounces yogurt (you choose your favorite)
- ¾ cup milk; 1% or skim

Directions

- 1. Peel banana. Using cutting boards and butter knife, cut banana into 1-inch chunks. Place the banana chunks in the blender.
- 2. Place the frozen fruit, yogurt, and milk in the blender with the banana.
- 3. Cover the blender and blend on high speed for about 1 minute or until the mixture is smooth.
- 4. Pour smoothie into cups, and enjoy!
